She was tall, thin and wore a size 13 shoe. Above most, she was very proud of who she was. She was the eldest of 5 children and born in Texas, September 24, 1912. She is survived by her youngest brother, **Alvin Edwin VIVIAN**. So, this is where I will start.

In the early stages of my research, I was surprised to find that there was already so much research out there on the **VIVIANS**. I wrote it all down and assumed it to be correct. Years later, I have realized that so much of this information is incorrect and unfortunately, this incorrect information has been told, retold and documented so many times, it is everywhere. I decided to start from the beginning and only used this information as a “guide” to discover the truth about the **VIVIANS**. If you look hard enough and think reasonably, the truth slowly reveals itself. Some of the information I have found might not be accepted by all, but it is what it is.

Most of my research is done on my direct line. I do gather information on aunts, uncles, cousins, etc. if I run across it. Trying to research everyone is next to impossible. I have highlighted direct relationships in red to make things easier to follow and bolded and capitalized names that are family or related to the family either directly or indirectly.

Telling a story with only a few facts and not much else to go on is very hard to accomplish. Therefore, this book is made to be a living document. If you have additional information or corrections you think need to be made, let me know. If the information can be verified, full credit will be given to the source and the story will be changed. If you have photographs you would like to add, I would be happy to add them as well.

I hope that as you read, you can imagine the proud life of the **VIVIANS** and fully appreciate the incredibly hard life they lived. I can honestly say that I am very proud to be a part of this family.

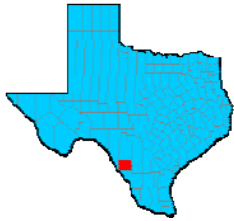

Velma Ruth VIVIAN



This story begins with my grandmother, **Velma Ruth VIVIAN**. She was born September 24, 1912 and went by Ruth. My mother said that she was born at home and she believes that her parents lived in Dimmit County, Texas at the time. I found her living with her parents, **Kelly Edward VIVIAN, Sr.** and **Dona Florence TUMLINSON**, in the 1920 Uvalde County census and the 1930 Dimmit County census.

My grandmother married my grandfather, **Forrest Elden ENEKS**, in Asherton, Dimmit County, Texas. I am not sure of the date, but it had to be sometime between April 1930 and February 1933 when she was approximately 17 to 20 years old and he was approximately 23 to 25 years old. My mother said that my grandmother's parents did not approve of the marriage, therefore they did not attend the ceremony. My uncle, **James Elden ENEKS**, was born February 1, 1933 in Maverick County, Texas when she was 20 years old and my mother, **Doris Ruth ENEKS**, was born April 12, 1939 in Eagle Pass, Maverick County, Texas when she was 26 years old.

I knew my grandmother well. My first memories are of a small house in Corpus Christi, Texas on Saratoga close to the Ayers intersection. There were approximately 8 wooden houses with the same floor plan all in a row and these houses were said to be old military houses. They lived in the last one and my uncle, James and his wife Peggy, lived next door. This had to be in the mid sixties. Next, they moved to Mathis, Texas and bought a laundry mat. They lived in a mobile home behind the building. When we would visit, my grandmother would make me help her fold clothes. The laundry mat wasn't air conditioned and I remember that it was so hot, you thought you were going to die. In 1970, hurricane Celia hit Corpus Christi and made its way to Mathis. My grandparent's mobile home was completely destroyed. They left a few minutes before the storm hit and rode it out at the high school. When they returned, the trailer had been lifted up and turned upside down. During the time that they lived in Mathis, I began to notice my grandmother's arm starting to shake. She would try to hide it from us, but my mother told us that she had been diagnosed with Parkinson Disease. Eventually, my grandparents moved out to a place on Lake Mathis.

Before my grandmother passed away, my mother asked her about her life and wrote down what she could. Here are some of my grandmother's stories as a child:

I didn't care to ride horses, but I would ride on the back rear of my dad's horse. I managed to hang on to something. A few times my mother got on a horse, but not often. When they were first married, my dad got someone in Laredo to make her a riding skirt (maybe San Antonio). It was a long flared skirt with the seam in the middle. He wanted her to ride with him. My mother and father were crazy about one another. They never fussed. I called her Ma and him Papa.

Someone pooped in the slop jar. I covered the jar with Milton's shirt and the sleeve hung down in the poop. He grabs his shirt the next day and he didn't notice the sleeve until he got it on. We wore our clothes more than once. He was so mad at me, he almost killed me.

When I was around 10 years old, I went to Uvalde with my dad to buy a Model T. He paid \$800 for the car. They gave him instructions on how to drive it and issued him a driver's license. They asked, "Mr. Vivian, do you want someone to drive you home?" He replied, "No, I can do it." So off we go and we came to the ranch gate. He said, "Toots, go open the gate." I got my foot on the running board and Papa hit the gas instead of the brake. I fell off on the ground and skinned my knees and Papa went through the gate. He was so upset and yelling, "Toots, are you okay?" He thought that he may have run over me. I was fine other than scared as bad as he was. He was so proud of the car, he kept it under the shed. Papa had a hard time keeping the chickens from roosting on it. When the Model A came out, we traded it in. After Papa had the new car for awhile, he didn't like a thing about that Model T.

We bathed in a dirt tank sometime, but most of the time, we bathed in a number 3 washtub. We would set it out in the sun to warm. If it was winter, we would have to heat our water.

My Uncle Fate was blind and he lived with us. No one wanted to take him and keep him. Mama didn't mind for he was always so good to her and us kids. Papa liked him a lot too. He wasn't always blind, in his earlier years he was able to see. He told Mama he could teach her how to drive. Papa was away tending the ranch and we lived in town, Eagle Pass. We would go back and forth to the ranch and then we would stay in town, so it would be better for us to go to school. So, Uncle Fate, talked Mama into letting him teach her how to drive. He said, "I can do the shifting and you can see to drive." He got us kids seated and he began to tell her how to shift the gears. Around the curve we went and hit the only other car in Catarina! Uncle Fate was yelling, "Donie, what did you hit?" Us kids fell to the

floor and sand went all over us. The fender was bent some. Mama was teased for years about her “big accident.”

My dad went on a cattle drive out on one of the ranches. No one is home but Mama and Uncle Fate, Milton and me. Mama feels she should load the shotgun in case of trouble. There are “wet backs” that come in thru a lot. It is getting dark and we are all together in the room. Mama loads the shotgun and says, as she sits it against the rock fireplace, “It’s loaded for bear.” BOOM, it went off and rock went blasting all over us. We were screaming and Uncle Fate was yelling, “Donie, you have killed us all!” He could not see, but he felt the blast. That rock stung our arms and face as it blew up.

On the Vivian Ranch, there is a cemetery. My great grandparents are buried there. You can see their small tombstones. I would pick wild flowers and walk with my Grandma to the cemetery. The house is close to Pendencia Creek. The house was built out of lumber and did not have a lick of paint on it. My dad lived there as a boy. At times, I would stay in the house with Grandma Vivian. There were Oak trees along Pendencia Creek and Mesquite trees shaded the house. The ranch was very large and they bought and sold cattle and also caught wild cattle and branded them as theirs. They also raised hogs and a few chickens. I rode with Papa in the wagon out to repair barbed wire fences and the boys rode by horseback. The wagon was pulled by a bay stallion. My mama went sometimes or stayed back to cook and do her chores. Sometimes we took picnic lunches and our water canvas bag. When it got too hot, we cooled off in a dirt tank. Those were the good old days.

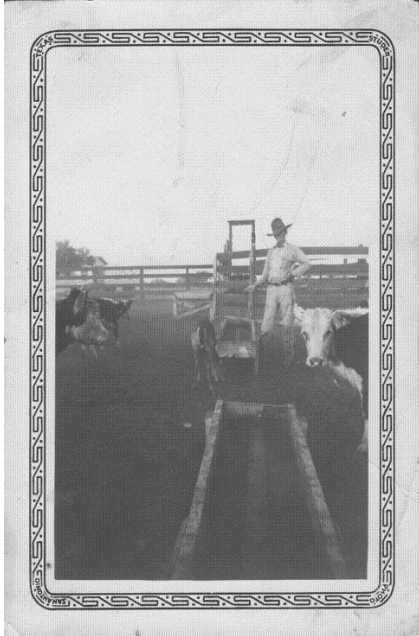
My Grandma Vivian sold the Vivian Ranch piece by piece until it was all gone and it broke my dad’s heart. She never discussed it with her children. Mama said that one day, there was a knock on the front door and [doesn’t mention who was at door] said, “Kel, you have to move, Mama’s sold the place.” Mama said that our place was the last place to be sold and she doubted that James Vivian had anything to do with it. Grandma Vivian made all the decisions.

I have been able to corroborate most of my grandmother’s story. However, land grants suggest that my grandmother’s grandparents would have been living on Pena Creek, not Pendencia Creek when my grandmother was young. The Pendencia Creek land was sold around 1880. I am assuming that her and her grandmother would have visited the cemetery when it was owned by someone else.

My grandfather passed away with a cancerous brain tumor on January 28, 1992 when he was 84 years old. My grandmother passed away from Parkinson Disease on July 30, 1995 when she was 82 years old.

Kelly Edward VIVIAN, Sr.

My great grandfather was **Kelly Edward VIVIAN, Sr.** I did not know him because he died well before I was born. I do remember my great grandmother very well. You will have to read my book on the **TUMLINSONS** to find out more about her family.



My great grandfather was born October 15, 1879 in Carrizo Springs, Dimmit County, Texas. I found him living with his parents, **James Milton VIVIAN** and **Mary Elizabeth BROWN**, in the 1880 and 1910 Dimmit County census. I have been told that my great grandfather was a Ranch Foreman and a hard working man.

He married my great grandmother, **Dona Florence TUMLINSON**, on April 12, 1911 in Dimmit County, Texas when he was 31 years old and she was 18 years old. Even though I do not have a marriage certificate, this information was confirmed from the following website:

Kelly Edward VIVIAN, Sr.

My great grandmother was **Dona Florence TUMLINSON**. Many have her first name as Donna, but it was Dona and rhymed with Mona. We called her "Tykie." I loved visiting my great grandmother. She was a large woman, overweight and always smiling. She lived by herself in a retirement community in Corpus Christi, Texas on Ayers Street. I remember going to her apartment many times. She spent most of her time crocheting and sewing. She made dolls out of anything; coca-cola bottles and bleach bottles to name a few. I remember seeing home movies of her catching a chicken for dinner, wringing its neck and plucking it.

My grandmother said that her father rented a house in town, so the kids could attend school. On the 1920 Uvalde County census, they rented their house. They also had a boarder living with them named James Goodwin. My great grandfather's occupation was a Manager and he worked on a farm. James Goodwin was a laborer. On the 1930 Dimmit County census, they owned their home. My great grandfather's occupation was a Stockman and he worked on a ranch. Unfortunately, I couldn't find Uncle Fate living with them on either census. I am assuming that this uncle maybe my grandmother's great uncle, **Lafayette VIVIAN**. He died on December 17, 1922. The Model T became popular beginning 1908, but my grandmother said that she was about 10 years old when her dad bought his first car. That would have been about 1922. If Uncle Fate taught my great grandmother how to drive, my grandmother must have been younger than 10 years old when they purchased the car. The Model A did come out after the Model T around 1927.

James Milton VIVIAN

My gg grandfather was **James Milton VIVIAN**. He was born May 26, 1849 in Goliad County, Texas. I found him living with his parents, **Lloyd VIVION** and **Caroline GIBSON**, in the 1860 Goliad County census. On my gg grandfather's death certificate, his father is listed as **Lloyd Edward VIVION**, however I don't think this is correct. This is the only record that I have found referring to a middle name for his father. Some have also recorded his middle name as Thomas and I have found evidence of a **L.T. VIVION** in Missouri. Sometime during this generation, the spelling of **VIVION** was changed to **VIVIAN**, as well. I will refer to him as **Lloyd T. VIVION** until I find proof of his middle name.

My gg grandfather married my gg grandmother, **Mary Elizabeth BROWN**, about 1877 according to the 1910 Dimmit County census. I am not sure where, but all things point to Dimmit or Maverick County, Texas. He was approximately 28 years old and she was approximately 17 years old.

My gg grandmother, **Mary Elizabeth BROWN**, was born October 20, 1860 and lived a hard life according to stories that were told to my mother when she was a child. Her father, **Charles E. BROWN**, served in the Civil War. He was with Company K, 21 Texas Cavalry. He enlisted for duty on February 7, 1862 in Goliad, Texas. Per his Company's muster roll, he was present until September & October 1863. His records' state that he was sick on furlough since the 25th of September furloughed for 60 days by the board of physicians. He doesn't appear on any other records after that date. It appears that he may have died from his illness. Mary had an older brother, **John E. BROWN** born about 1859 and a younger sister, **Cornelia Francis BROWN** born August 1863. Mary's mother, **Amelia Emily BUSBY**, remarries about 1865 to **James Leroy GIBSON**, son of **Leroy GIBSON**. **Leroy GIBSON** is **James Milton VIVIAN**'s uncle and his mother's brother. Mary and her new family can be found living with her aunt, **Francis BELL**, on the 1870 Goliad County census and on the 1870 Maverick County census. These two census schedules were taken 3 months of each other, so the family must have moved from Goliad County, Texas to Maverick County, Texas during 1870 between July 25th and September 8th to appear on both schedules.



Mary Elizabeth BROWN

Per documents filed with the Texas General Land Office, on June 16, 1874, **James Milton VIVIAN** stated that he had lived on Pendencia Creek in Maverick County, Texas for the past 3 years and that he had complied fully with the homestead law. **C.H. VIVION** (Uncle) and **George W. WHALEY** (Uncle in-law) were both witnesses to the claim. James was granted 80 acres of land of which he was entitled per the Pre-Emption Grant, Survey #540.

Pre-emption grants were made after statehood. From 1866 to 1898, up to 160 acres could be claimed. Homesteaders were required to live on the land for three years and make improvements (such as building a barn) in order to qualify for a pre-emption grant of 160 acres.¹

He would have been issued this grant when he was single and 25 years old. On December 7, 1883, Delilah Taylor, filed a “proof of abandonment” by **James M. VIVION** for the 80 acre tract of land. The claim states that **James M. VIVION** sold his right and interest in the property to said Delilah Taylor. Delilah Taylor claimed to have lived on the land for the past 3 years beginning 1880.

The family is listed on the 1880 Dimmit County, Texas census living next door to Mary Margaret (Hester), James’ sister. **Simon LOVE** is living with them. Next to Mary Margaret is their mother, Caroline. Researchers claim that the **VIVIANS** found **Simon LOVE**, an orphan, on their trip from Goliad County to Dimmit County and took him in.

On January 9, 1886, **James Milton VIVIAN** purchased a Quit-Claim Deed, Survey #531, for 135 acres on Pena Creek in Dimmit County, Texas. He paid \$500 to Horace Hughes for the claim. The claim states that **James M. VIVIAN** has lived on the land for three consecutive years beginning December 19, 1882. **Grey WHITE** (close friend of the family) and **C.V. BUSBY** (Mary’s Uncle) were both witnesses to the claim.

The family is listed on the 1910 Dimmit County, Texas census and the 1930 Maverick County, Texas census.

The **VIVIAN** Cemetery is located on the 80 acres of land that was sold to Delilah Taylor, however the **VIVIAN’S** continued to bury their family members in the cemetery as late as 1898. My grandmother stated that her great grandparents were buried in the **VIVIAN** Cemetery on the ranch. I assume that if this is true, it must be Mary’s parents. James’ parents are both buried in Goliad, Texas in a private cemetery on the land they once owned. The **VIVIAN** Cemetery has numerous marked and unmarked headstones. I visited the cemetery about 1993 with my parents. The land owners were very gracious and told us that we could visit anytime we wanted. I took pictures of the marked headstones, but there are several headstones that are made of rocks. You can tell that there is a larger stone for the head and a smaller stone for the foot. 
